Initially in his life, Ignatius was a man of the world having his share of vices and addictions such as pride, vanity, lust for power, gambling and even violence. These were part and parcel of his life till that cannonball shattered his knee. The rest is history and his story.

During his recovery and his subsequent conversion, when he tried to give up these worldly pleasures, he was tormented by them to the point of suicide. To battle these demons, Ignatius plunged headlong into prayer- buttressing it with fasting- thus surrendering everything to His Will. He then challenged the devil with "Wretched being, can you promise me a single hour of life". And with this we are told he overcame the temptation and remained in peace. Most bullies when challenged are cowards and the devil is one such but one needs steadfast faith.

aving celebrated the Christmas season recently, we will soon approach the season of Lent. This year Ash Wednesday falls on St Valentine's day - a day associated with love. Lent also corresponds to suffering - a difficult topic. But for Christians, it's a subject that's difficult to avoid. This is encapsulated in the words of Jesus, "Take up your Cross daily and follow me", highlighting the call for daily sacrifice and dedication.

During the forty-day Lenten season, Christians are encouraged to contemplate the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus, and relate it to their own personal suffering. The aim is to find a spiritual significance in suffering, a task that may prove challenging. Despite the difficulty, the endeavour is seen as a noble pursuit, potentially deepening the spiritual connection between suffering and spirituality. It is through enduring hardships that we acquire wisdom, develop empathy, and gain a deeper understanding of the world and ourselves.

Experiencing pain and suffering can sometimes hinder spiritual practices such as prayer. The distractions and focus disruptions caused by pain make it challenging to engage fully in any form of spiritual activity. However, pain and suffering can be transformative,


fostering a greater level of compassion in individuals. Personal experiences of hardship can make one more aware of the potential hidden struggles of others, whether they are visible or not. Such experiences can also increase one's empathy towards the less fortunate, such as the homeless or hungry.

Life's time is precious and should be used for discerning and performing good deeds in God's love. The Church, in this context, is continually growing towards Christ's full maturity. Valentine's Day is associated with love, but it also carries a connotation of suffering for some. Love, in its purest form, is not devoid of pain and heartache. Thus, Valentine's Day serves as a poignant reminder of love's dual nature - its capacity to heal and to hurt.





Tell us about your early journey to priesthood. How and when did you get your calling TO BE A JESUIT

I guess it begun with stories of saints which my eldest sister used to tell me. Sometimes she ended those story-telling sessions with a question "Do you want to be a saint?" And in my childhood innocence I used to joyfully say that I want to be a saint. Later, the lives of priests and religious in my parish drew my attention. It was a gradual process. I could not recall a definite point of time wherein I got a call as such. My liking for the Jesuits also grew over many years, spanning through high school to my final year of college. It ran almost parallel with my attraction towards becoming a priest.

How has your family supported you along the way? What was their reaction when you told them you wanted to be a priest?

I am very grateful to my family, especially my father and mother who planted the seed of faith in me and helped me nurture it. Being one of the younger children in my family my elder siblings also helped me grow in faith by their life and example. This I believed apart from the grace of God, prepared me to sense my vocation to the priesthood and gave me the courage to respond to it.

It was a mixed response when they learnt of my desire to be a priest. Because being the youngest among sons and an elder brother already in the seminary (now an MSFS priest) they were like, "Is not one priest enough from our family?" and "Are you not supposed to take care of mummy and daddy?" Nonetheless they allowed me to join the seminary and supported me all along. Without their blessing, prayer, and support my journey to the priesthood would have been a lot less easy.

What was going through your mind as you lay prostrate before the altar AND WHEN THE PRIESTS LAID THEIR HANDS ON YOU during your ordination?

A recurring prayer, "Help me be a priest after the heart of God."

A memorable experience in YOUR JESUIT FORMATION

Once in my first year of formation, I shared to my confessor and spiritual guide, my insecurity about my humble beginning. After listening patiently, he firmly but gently asked me, "David will you be ashamed of Jesus because he was from a poor family?" The question deeply impacted me and continues to shape my understanding of poverty, incarnation, and love.

What do you look forward to most as an ordained priest? Celebrating the sacraments and sharing the merciful love of God with all.

Is there anything else you would like to add that may help young boys and girls in their vocation. My dear young people at baptism each of us is given a new name, new identity, and mission. Each one's mission is different. Discover and live that mission.
